Bios



Ronald Feldman, director

Twice winner of the American Symphony League's ASCAP Award for Adventuresome Programming of Contemporary Music, Ronald Feldman has achieved critical acclaim for his work as conductor and cellist. He has appeared as guest conductor with major orchestras such as the London Symphony Orchestra, Boston Pops Orchestra, Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra, the Saint Louis Symphony, and the Quebec Symphony, as well as many regional orchestras including the Pro Arte Symphony, Springfield Symphony, Albany Symphony, and the Amarillo Symphony. In August of

2016 Mr. Feldman recorded three albums of music by Kevin Kaska with the Royal Scottish National Orchestra.

After successful appearances as guest conductor for three consecutive seasons at Symphony Hall and at Tanglewood, the Boston Symphony's summer home, composer and Conductor John Williams appointed Mr. Feldman Assistant Conductor of the Boston Pops Orchestra. He served as assistant to John Williams from 1989-1993.

Maestro Seiji Ozawa, Conductor Laureate of the Boston Symphony Orchestra, called Maestro Feldman "an outstanding conductor...I find him to have a deep musical mind which is clearly conveyed through his performances...."

John Williams, composer & Conductor Laureate of the Boston Pops Orchestra called Maestro Feldman, "a brilliant conductor, who displays the best leadership qualities...an outstandingly high level of musicianship that imbues his conducting style with strength, taste, and imagination". Mr. Feldman joined the Boston Symphony at the age of 19. He has appeared as cello soloist with many orchestras performing a wide range of concerto repertoire from Dvorak to Ligeti. His many chamber music affiliations have included performances with the Boston Symphony Chamber Players, Collage New Music Ensemble, the Boston Conservatory Chamber Players, and the Williams Chamber Players. His performances include collaborations with artists Emanuel Ax, Garrick Ohlsson, Gil Shaham, and Yo Yo Ma.

Mr. Feldman currently directs the Berkshire Symphony, a regional orchestra in residence at Williams College. He was formerly the conductor and Music Director of the New England Philharmonic and the Worcester Orchestra. He is on the faculties of Williams College, the New England Conservatory of Music, and The Boston Conservatory of Music. 2012 marked the beginning of his tenure as Music Director of the Longwood Symphony Orchestra, the orchestra of Boston's medical community.

Mr. Feldman appears on a compact disk recording of an all-Mozart program with the Bucharest "George Enescu" Philharmonic. This CD received excellent reviews in the March/April 1999 issues of the *American Record Guide* and *Fanfare Magazine*.

He also conducts the London Symphony in a recording of music of John Williams and Kevin Kaska. This recording is with virtuoso trumpet player Arturo Sandoval.

In 2001 Mr. Feldman left the Boston Symphony Orchestra to pursue other musical interests. He joined the faculty of Williams College where he is Artist in Residence, and Conductor of the award-winning Berkshire Symphony.



Anabella Cheong '24, piano

Anabella Cheong is a biology and anthropology double major on the pre-medical track from Aliso Viejo, California. She studies piano with Doris Stevenson at Williams College and has studied with Kevin Fitzgerald and Leonid Levitsky in the past. She won first prize at the American Protege International Concerto Competition, performing solo at Carnegie Hall. On campus, she played in George Li's masterclass and performed a collection of trios by Max Bruch at St. John's Chapel. She currently plays as an accompanist for the Williams Concert Choir. While not juggling music

and academics, she works as an emergency department medical scribe at Berkshire Medical Center with plans to attend medical school and become a physician.

Chen Chen Huang is an Economics and Music double major from Lexington, MA. Originally from Shanghai, China, Chen Chen began her musical journey at a young age with the piano. She discovered her passion for the flute in third grade and has been studying the instrument ever since, now under the tutelage of Jacqueline DeVoe. Chen Chen is an active member of the Williams music community, regularly performing with the Berkshire Symphony and a woodwind quintet of talented peers. She has also performed at various college events, including Studio Recitals, Midweekmusic, and

Convocation, where she has played a diverse repertoire spanning works by Dutilleux, Doppler, and Villa-Lobos. She will also hold a senior recital at the end of the semester to celebrate her growth and the many who have helped her along her musical journey. After graduation, she will pursue a career in the consulting industry in New York City while continuing her passion for music.

Carolyn Mielke is a music and history major from Phoenix, Arizona. She currently studies voice with Erin Casey and sings in the Williams Concert and Chamber Choirs. to high school, Ah Ling Neu for continuing Ray's musical development, and above all, his family, who supported him through every private lesson, performance, and audition, and for enduring his many evenings of loud, shrill practice sessions.
