Bios



Ronald Feldman, director

Twice winner of the American Symphony League's ASCAP Award for Adventuresome Programming of Contemporary Music, Ronald Feldman has achieved critical acclaim for his work as conductor and cellist. He has appeared as guest conductor with major orchestras such as the London Symphony Orchestra, Boston Pops Orchestra, Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra, the Saint Louis Symphony, and the Quebec Symphony, as well as many regional orchestras including the Pro Arte Symphony, Springfield Symphony, Albany Symphony, and the Amarillo Symphony. In August of 2016 Mr. Feldman recorded three albums of music by Kevin Kaska with the Royal Scottish National Orchestra.

After successful appearances as guest conductor for three consecutive seasons at Symphony Hall and at Tanglewood, the Boston Symphony's summer home, composer and Conductor John Williams appointed Mr. Feldman Assistant Conductor of the Boston Pops Orchestra. He served as assistant to John Williams from 1989-1993.

Maestro Seiji Ozawa, Conductor Laureate of the Boston Symphony Orchestra, called Maestro Feldman "an outstanding conductor...I find him to have a deep musical mind which is clearly conveyed through his performances...."

John Williams, composer & Conductor Laureate of the Boston Pops Orchestra called Maestro Feldman, "a brilliant conductor, who displays the best leadership qualities...an outstandingly high level of musicianship that imbues his conducting style with strength, taste, and imagination".

Mr. Feldman joined the Boston Symphony at the age of 19. He has appeared as cello soloist with many orchestras performing a wide range of concerto repertoire from Dvorak to Ligeti. His many chamber music affiliations have included performances with the Boston Symphony Chamber Players, Collage New Music Ensemble, the Boston Conservatory Chamber Players, and the Williams Chamber Players. His performances include collaborations with artists Emanuel Ax, Garrick Ohlsson, Gil Shaham, and Yo Yo Ma.

In 2001 Mr. Feldman left the Boston Symphony Orchestra to pursue other musical interests. Mr. Feldman is Artist in Residence in Orchestral and Instrumental Activities/Lecturer in Music, Director of the Berkshire Symphony, Emeritus at Williams College. He was formerly the conductor and Music Director of the New England Philharmonic and the Worcester Orchestra. He has held positions on the faculties of Williams College, the New England Conservatory of Music, Boston Conservatory of Music, and the Longwood Symphony Orchestra.

Mr. Feldman appears on a compact disk recording of an all-Mozart program with the Bucharest "George Enescu" Philharmonic. This CD received excellent reviews in the March/April 1999 issues of the *American Record Guide* and *Fanfare Magazine*.

He also conducted the London Symphony in a recording of music of John Williams and Kevin Kaska, recording with trumpet virtuoso Arturo Sandoval.



Jessie Burdette '25, viola

Jessie Burdette is a senior biology major from Winston-Salem, North Carolina. She began playing violin at the age of 5 and took up viola while in high school at the University of North Carolina School of the Arts under the guidance of Ulrich Eichenauer. At Williams, she studies viola with Ah Ling Neu and regularly performs with the Berkshire Symphony and in several chamber ensembles. Outside of classical music, Jessie plays fiddle and banjo, having studied with Rex McGee

and Alasdair Fraser. She played in two bluegrass/old-time/Celtic/Americana bands before coming to Williams, with which she performed at festivals and gigs throughout North Carolina and Scotland. She has also played for several Cap & Bells and theater department shows, recently took the songwriting Winter Study class, and formed a Celtic band with other students. She is planning a senior recital in May that will be the culmination of her favorite musical moments on viola, fiddle, and banjo at Williams. Outside of labs and rehearsals, Jessie runs the NovelTeas book club and enjoys running, working in Hopkins Forest, baking, and riding horses. After graduation, she plans to take a gap year before attending veterinary school.



Locke Meyer '25, clarinet

Locke Meyer is a music and computer science double major from St. Louis, Missouri. When he was in the sixth grade, his band director had him blow into flute, trumpet, and clarinet mouthpieces; he could only make a sound on the last of the three, and became a clarinetist by process of elimination. At Williams, he has studied with Paul Green, Bixby Kennedy, and Michael Dee. Last year, while abroad in Vienna, Austria, he received instruction from Stefan Neubauer. On cam-

pus, he enjoys playing in the Berkshire Symphony, with the I/O New Music Ensemble, and with various chamber music groups. Off campus, he enjoys cooking, rocking out, watching movies, reading novels and poetry, and sampling such exotic flavors of sparkling water as "Banana Bergamot" and "Mild Spruce." After delivering a senior recital in May and graduating, he plans to build pipe organs while continuing to perform as a clarinetist in the Boston area. Richard O'Donnell '27, violin

Richard O'Donnell, 19, began violin study at the age of 4. He was enrolled at the San Francisco Conservatory of Music, Pre-College Division, under the tutelage of William Barbini. During his high school career, Richard participated in the San Francisco Symphony Youth Orchestra as well as the College Preparatory School Orchestra, Pit Orchestra, and Chamber Music Programs. With the Young People's Symphony Orchestra, he served as Concertmaster and was the 2022-23 Concerto

Competition Winner, performing the Khachaturian Violin Concerto. In previous summers, Richard attended the Philadelphia International Music Festival, the Juilliard Summer Strings Program in Geneva, and the Meadowmount School of Music, studying with I-Hao Lee. During his time at the Boston University Tanglewood Institute, Richard was selected as Principal Second Violin of the Young Artists' Orchestra and was invited to perform Vaughan Williams' "Serenade to Music" as violin soloist with the Young Artists' Chorus in Seiji Ozawa Hall. A sophomore at Williams College, Richard is a prospective double-major in Music and Economics. Under the instruction of Joanna Kurkowicz, O'Donnell became the first Williams freshman in at least thirty-five years to hold a full-length recital, performing the Ravel "Blues" Violin Sonata and Brahms Violin Concerto. Additionally, Richard is Concertmaster of the Opera Workshop's Pit Orchestra and the Associate Concertmaster of the Berkshire Symphony, where he also works as concert program annotator. O'Donnell has collaborated with numerous musical ensembles, including the Williams Chamber Players, the Concert and Chamber Choirs, the Saints Patrick & Raphael Music Ministry, the Student Mass Music Ministry, and the Northern Berkshire Chorale. He has performed in masterclasses led by Gerald Elias, Eugene Drucker, Judith Ingolfsson, and Lucie Robert. This summer, O'Donnell will pursue German language immersion while studying violin with Tomas Tomaszewski in Berlin and Poland. In his free time, Richard enjoys listening to new music as well as reading novels and music biographies.
